We need to teach the Millennials to be good digital citizens and ask them to think carefully about every post they make and every photo they tag in social media, as well as to provide the tools to diffuse a situation before someone get hurts. We also need to tell and teach parents to be aware that cyber bullying is most likely a par to their children life, thus they need to set rules and boundaries for the children, keep doing digital checkup continuously, review followers or those they follow, block the bully, save the evidence, and stay positive and polite (Katzen, 2015; Norling, 2016). Additionally, the appropriate attitudes and behaviors among students should be

emphasized in every curriculum in all educational institutions.

At the end, we expect to see each generation in Indonesia could respect and uplift each other with writing and sharing information in the near future, and realize that they can use their lives to make an impact for others, regardless of their age.

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
